INTRODUCTION

A college education is one of the biggest—and best—investments you will ever make. But college costs might not be as big a concern as you think. Financial assistance is available from several sources, and many of our students who didn't think they would qualify for financial aid have been pleasantly surprised.

The following information will give you some idea about the availability of financial assistance for CCC students based on actual 2008-2009 figures:

- 3,688 students received over \$12.4 million in financial aid for an average award of \$3,384. This includes all types of financial aid including loans. When loans are excluded, the average award was \$2,155.
- Our students received federally guaranteed loans totaling more than \$4.7 million.
- About \$1,300,000 in aid is provided to our students each year through institutional and privately funded scholarships.
- Approximately 45 percent of the aid which our students receive is based on financial need.

As you can see from these facts, there are many opportunities to receive financial assistance. It's a good idea to apply for financial aid, even if you aren't sure you will qualify.

TYPES OF AID

Financial assistance is available through federal and state programs, through programs supported by the college, and through privately funded scholarship programs. Four types of aid are available:

1. Grants.
2. Loans.
3. Employment Programs.
4. Scholarships.

Grants

Federal Pell Grant

This federal program provides direct grants to students to help pay college costs. Amounts awarded to students attending Central Community College during the 2010-11 award year range from \$1113 to \$5550 a year, depending on enrollment status and expected family contribution (EFC). The EFC is determined by the results of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Students may be eligible for additional grant assistance in the summer. Contact the Financial Aid Office for more information.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG)

This federal program provides assistance to Pell eligible students with exceptional financial need as measured by the lowest expected family contribution (EFC). Eligible students attending at least half time are awarded \$600 for a full academic year. All eligible students with completed financial aid files by April 1 will be given priority consideration for SEOG grants.

Academic Competitiveness Grant

This federal program provides assistance to Pell eligible undergraduate students who graduated from high school in 2005 or later. In addition, you must have completed a rigorous high school program of study and attend at least half time to qualify. Freshmen are eligible for up to \$750. Sophomores who meet the grade requirement of 3.0 are eligible for up to \$1,300.

Nebraska State Grant Program (NOG)

This state program provides assistance to financial aid applicants with an expected family contribution (EFC) of 6000 or less for the 2010-11 school year. NOG grants are funded by the Federal government through the Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnership Grant program, the State of Nebraska, and where applicable, other contributing partners. Eligible students attending at least half time are awarded \$600 for a full academic year. All eligible students with completed financial aid files by April 1 will be given priority consideration for these grants. NOG grants are subject to approval by the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education.

Federal Direct Loan Program

Federal Stafford Student Loan

This federal program provides low-interest loans to students attending college at least half time. Loan applications are certified by the campus financial aid office and funded through the Department of Education.

Undergraduate students may qualify for subsidized Stafford loans, which are based on need. The federal government pays the interest on subsidized loans while students are attending college at least half time.

Students may also qualify for unsubsidized Stafford loans, which are not based on need. The borrower is responsible for the interest under this loan option. In some cases, a student may have both a subsidized loan and an unsubsidized loan.

Dependent students in the first year of a program of study may borrow up to \$5,500 while second-year students may borrow up to \$6,500. Students are classified first-year for student loan purposes until earning 30 hours pursuant toward an eligible program of study. Independent students may have higher loan limits. The maximum amounts undergraduates may borrow during their college program are \$31,000 for dependent students and \$57,500 for independent students. Borrowers are subject to an interest rate of 4.5% for the subsidized loan and 6.8% for the unsubsidized loan.

The financial aid office will inform student borrowers of the type of loan for which they are eligible (subsidized, unsubsidized or a combination of the two). The financial aid office also will inform borrowers of their maximum loan eligibility. Students should contact the financial aid office to make sure they have a clear understanding of their own specific loan situation.

The financial aid director may refuse to certify a Stafford loan or reduce the amount you request based on extenuating circumstances.

Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS)

The PLUS program assists parents of dependent students in paying college costs. Loan applications are certified by the campus financial aid office and funded through private lending institutions. Parents are responsible for repayment which begins 30 days after the origination of the loan. Contact the lender about repayment options for these loans.

The annual loan limit is the school's financial aid cost of attendance, minus any other financial aid the student plans to receive.

Borrowers are subject to a fixed interest rate of 8.5 percent.

If your parent applies for and is denied a PLUS, you may be eligible for additional funds through the federal Stafford loan program.

If you want a more detailed explanation of this federal loan program, contact the financial aid office for information. Brochures explaining all federal loan programs are available.

Federal Work Study

This federal program provides part-time jobs for students demonstrating financial need. Hourly rates must meet or exceed the federal minimum wage. Students must be attending at least half time and usually work five to 15 hours a week. Work study assignments are typically based on the amount of

unmet need, date of application, and suitability of skills for the position. Final assignment to a federal work-study position requires an interview with the campus work study coordinator and/or the job supervisor.

The majority of these jobs are performed on the college campus. Additionally, there are community service jobs that may be located either on- or off-campus. At least one of these positions is part of the American Reads Challenge, a reading tutoring program for children in grades pre-kindergarten through elementary. Students are encouraged to consider community service work study jobs whenever possible. Contact the campus financial aid office for further information.

Scholarships

The Central Community College Board of Governors authorizes a number of tuition waivers for each campus. In 2009-10, over \$250,000 was awarded in scholarships for athletics, the arts, and special academic achievement. For more information, talk to the financial aid director on the campus you plan to attend.

In addition, almost \$1,000,000 was awarded to Central Community College students in 2009-10 through institutional and privately-funded scholarships. For more information, see the Scholarship section of this brochure.

FINANCIAL AID APPLICATION

Students are eligible to receive financial aid if they are:

1. A U.S. citizen or an eligible non-citizen.
2. Pursuing a degree, diploma, or course of study transfer to a degree program.
3. Meeting CCC financial aid academic standards of progress.
4. In compliance with other U.S. Department of Education requirements.

To be considered for full benefits, you must be enrolled full time (12 credit hours).

Central Community College is an open-door college. The mission of the college is to provide education for people 16 years of age or older who are not enrolled in high school. Eligibility for federal or state financial aid is based on the ability to benefit from a program of study, as demonstrated through one of the following three methods:

1. Have a high school diploma.
2. Have a GED or equivalent.
3. Pass all sections of an examination approved by the U.S. Department of Education.

If you do not have either a high school diploma or GED, please contact the financial aid office regarding "ability to benefit."

The college reserves the right to evaluate and determine if the college has a program that will fit the needs of an applicant. Applicants may be requested to visit with an admissions counselor, may be required to participate in assessment testing and may be required to enroll in basic skill courses which are intended to help students succeed in college. Admission to the college does not grant admission to all courses or programs.

Application Procedures

Students must apply for financial aid each school year.

To apply for financial aid, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.gov. The information you provide on the application is used to determine your eligibility for financial aid. You will need a PIN to sign your application electronically. You can apply for a PIN at www.pin.ed.gov in advance or follow the steps at the end of the online application process to get a PIN.

FAFSA worksheets are available from any of our campus financial aid offices or from your high school counselor. Do not complete a financial aid supplement requiring a fee.

Accurate information from parent and student federal income tax returns, W-2 forms, and untaxed income benefit statements are required to complete the FAFSA.

When submitting your financial aid application, please designate the campus you plan to attend. You can list up to 10 colleges on the application.

If you have special circumstances or don't have access to the internet, contact the financial aid office to discuss some options for filing your application.

You must also complete a CCC [Financial Aid Information Form](#). Forward this form to the campus you plan to attend. Additional information may be requested when CCC receives the processed FAFSA information. If corrections are then required, processing will be delayed.

If you plan to begin studies at CCC the beginning of the fall semester, you should have a completed financial aid file by April 1 to receive priority consideration for campus-based financial assistance. This helps us process financial aid applications in an efficient manner before the beginning of each academic year. However, you can apply for financial aid throughout the year.

Verification

Verification is the process of checking the accuracy of the information provided by students when they apply for federal financial aid. Students must furnish any documentation requested.

Central Community College verifies at least 30% of its applicants each award year. A student selected for verification will be given 15 days to provide all requested documentation. Failure to respond within the allotted time period will create a delay in the completion of the student's financial aid file.

In the event financial aid has been disbursed to a student based on incorrect data that results in an overpayment, the student will be contacted and asked to respond within 15 days with either a full reimbursement of the overpayment, or a satisfactory arrangement for returning the amount of the overpayment. Failure to make a satisfactory arrangement by the deadline will result in the account being turned over to collection. Students are ineligible for any further federal financial assistance when they owe a repayment.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- The amount of financial aid received is adjusted according to enrollment status:

Full time	12 credit hours or more
Three-quarter time	9-11 credit hours
Half time	6-8 credit hours
Less than half time	1-5 credit hours
- All grants and most scholarships are credited to your CCC account. Any funds remaining after tuition, fees, room and board (if applicable), and bookstore charges will be issued to you according to Student Accounts refund practices approximately two weeks into the semester.
- You must complete a Master Promissory Note (MPN) and Entrance Loan Counseling to apply for your first student loan at CCC. Specific instructions will be provided after your financial aid file is completed.
- It is not necessary to complete the MPN every year. To receive a Stafford loan in a subsequent year, simply specify your interest in student loans on the FAFSA.
- Federal Stafford Student loan funds are credited to your student account via electronic funds transfer. Any loan funds remaining in your account after deducting for tuition, fees, room and board (if applicable), and bookstore charges will be issued to you according to Student Accounts refund practices approximately two weeks into the semester.
- Institutional and federal guidelines require that the college waits 30 calendar days before disbursing the first installment of a Federal Stafford loan to a first-time CCC student. In addition, satisfactory attendance and course progress will be verified by instructors before we release loan proceeds. First-time students are those who have not previously attended CCC at least half time during a recent fall or spring semester.
 - A student must meet financial aid standards of progress in order to receive the second installment of a student loan.

STANDARDS OF PROGRESS

To remain in good financial standing, students must meet the following standards:

Credits Earned

Students must successfully pass 75 percent (rounded to the nearest whole number) of the credits for which they are officially registered each semester. However, students enrolled for 16 credits or more must successfully pass a minimum of 12 credits each semester.

Grade-Point Average

Students must maintain a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.0.

Failure to meet these financial aid standards of progress will result in the student being placed on financial aid suspension. The student on financial aid suspension will not receive any Title IV financial aid (federal grants, loans or work study) or institutional scholarships until he or she once again become eligible. Students on suspension can reinstate eligibility by successfully passing 100 percent of their registered credits during a subsequent semester and maintaining a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher. Students attending a regular semester must take at least six credit hours; students attending during the summer should contact the campus financial aid office regarding minimum requirements.

Special types of course registrations are handled as follows:

Coursework at another institution—Work completed at another institution may be used to remove a CCC suspension if:

1. The courses taken apply to the student's program of study.
2. The required grade-point average and number of hours were earned.
3. The student received no federal financial aid at the other institution.

Withdrawals—Students who withdraw during the 100 percent refund period will have their aid reduced if the withdrawal results in a change in enrollment status (i.e. from 12 to nine credits).

If a student drops a course after the 100 percent refund period, the course is still part of the student's official semester registration. For example, if a student is registered for 12 hours and then drops three, the student's official registration is still 12 hours, and he or she must complete the remaining nine credits to meet the 75 percent requirement. Financial aid will not be adjusted after the ten-day lock-in date (end of the 100 percent refund period).

Repetitions—Courses that a student withdrew from or failed may be retaken and count toward the student's registration. These courses will be measured when checking the student's standards of progress at the end of the semester.

Developmental Courses—If a student has been admitted to an eligible program, developmental courses will count the same as other courses in determining registration status and measuring standards of progress for financial aid purposes.

If a student is required to take developmental courses before being admitted to a program, the student will not be eligible to receive Title IV financial aid until the required developmental coursework is completed.

Maximum Time Frame—A student is expected to complete a degree or diploma by the time 150 percent of the number of credits required for graduation have been attempted. Developmental coursework is not included in the maximum time frame calculations. For example, a student enrolled in a 64-credit degree program is expected to finish that program by the time 96 credit hours have been attempted. If the student has not graduated by this time, no additional Title IV aid will be awarded.

A student who transfers credits from another institution will have an adjustment made based on the number of credit hours which apply to the program of study at CCC. For example, a student in a 64-credit degree program who transfer 30 credit hours, 15 of which apply to the student's program at CCC, will be expected to graduate by the time 81 credit hours have been attempted (the standard 96 minus 15 which were accepted from another institution).

Professional Judgment

The financial aid director may make exceptions to CCC's financial aid standards of progress (both semester standards and maximum time frame standards) on a case-by-case basis by exercising professional judgment. It is best to contact the financial aid director and your advisor as soon as you begin experiencing any difficulty. You should petition for an exception to semester standards by the end of the term. If extenuating circumstances exist, petitions will be accepted and reviewed up to 90 days after the end of the term.

COLLEGE COSTS

The student's family or personal financial circumstances and the cost of attendance determine financial need. Cost will vary depending on your program of study and living arrangements. Costs for 2009-10 are illustrated below. For more current information, contact a campus student accounts office.

Tuition and Fees

Tuition and fees are set by the college board of governors and are subject to change by its action at any time. For 2010-11, tuition for Nebraska residents is \$74.00 per semester hour. Nebraska residents also pay \$7.00 per semester hour in fees for all credits. The table below shows charges for Nebraska residents.

Students who are not Nebraska residents pay \$111.00 per semester hour in tuition. Out-of-state residents also pay \$7.00 per semester hour in fees for all credits.

Room and Board

Campus housing is available at the Columbus and Hastings campuses. Students living in campus residence halls must contract for both room and board. The charge for 2010-11 is \$2,560 per semester, which includes a double room and 14 meals a week. Students wanting 19 meals per week will pay \$2,780 per semester. Contracts are issued for the entire semester or summer session. Meal plans are also available to students not living in the residence halls.

Cost of Attendance

The following examples are provided to show estimated costs of attendance. These average financial aid budgets are for Nebraska residents enrolled for 15 semester hours during both the fall and spring semesters.

Direct costs are costs directly attributable to college attendance.

Related costs are living expenses students will incur while attending college.

Please remember that these examples are estimates only. Your actual expenses may vary depending on the program in which you enroll, and living arrangements and your lifestyle.

RETURN OF FEDERAL FUNDS

Federal financial aid recipients who withdraw or drop out during a semester may be subject to Return of Federal Funds calculations. The institution must calculate the amount of Title IV aid the student earned. Unearned federal funds will be returned to the federal student aid programs as required by federal regulations. Students will be required to repay all or a portion of the unearned federal funds. Specific examples are available upon request.

Because of these regulations, financial aid recipients who are considering a schedule change should contact the campus financial aid office to determine the consequences of any schedule change. Contact your campus financial aid office for further information.

FINANCIAL AID LEAVE OF ABSENCE

There are instances when a student may arrange to leave school temporarily with the intention of returning within 60 days. A leave of absence may be considered if:

- The student makes a written request for the leave of absence, stating the reason for the request.
- The leave of absence does not exceed 60 days.
- The school has granted only one leave of absence to the student in any 12 month period.
- The school does not charge the student for the leave of absence.

The procedure for requesting a leave of absence is as follows:

- The request for leave of absence must be made within 15 days from the last date of class attendance.
- Requests must be submitted to the Financial Aid Director at the campus the student is attending.
- Students will be notified in a timely manner regarding the approval or denial of their request for a leave of absence.
- Students who are granted a leave of absence will be notified of the required re-enrollment date for the leave to be valid.

A student who has been approved for a leave of absence is not considered to have withdrawn from the institution for financial purposes. A Return of Federal Funds calculation does not apply during the leave of absence. A student on approved leave of absence is considered to be enrolled at the school and would be eligible for an in-school deferment for his or her federal student loan. A student who takes an unapproved leave of absence is no longer enrolled at the school and is not eligible for an in-school deferment of his or her loans. A Return of Federal Funds calculation will be made based on the last date of attendance.

STUDENT RIGHTS

You have the right to ask Central Community College about the following:

- The names of accrediting and licensing organizations.
- Our programs, faculty and instructional, laboratory and other physical facilities.
- Cost of attendance and refund policies.
- Financial assistance available, including information on all federal, state, local, private and institutional financial aid programs.
- Procedures and deadlines for submitting applications for each available financial aid program.
- How financial aid recipients are selected.
- How your financial need is determined. This process includes how costs for tuition and fees, room and board, travel, books and supplies and miscellaneous personal expenses are considered in your cost of education. It also includes the resources considered in calculating your need (such as parental contribution, other financial aid and assets.)
- How much of your financial need, as determined by the college, has been met.

- How and when you will receive aid.
- An explanation of each type and amount of assistance in your financial aid package.
- The interest rate on any student loan you have, the total amount you must repay, the length of time you have to repay, when you must start repayment and what cancellation or deferment (postponement) provisions apply.
- For Federal Work Study recipients: hours you will work, job duties, your rate of pay and payment procedures.
- Special circumstances which may affect your financial aid eligibility.
- Satisfactory academic progress requirements.
- Special facilities and services available to the handicapped.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

It is your responsibility to:

- Review and consider all information about the college's program before you enroll.
- Pay special attention to your application for student financial aid. Complete it accurately, and submit it on time to the right place. Errors can delay your aid or prevent you from receiving aid.
- Provide all documentation, corrections and new information requested by the financial aid office.
- Read, understand and keep copies of all forms you're asked to sign.
- Notify the college of a change in your name, address, or attendance status (half time, three-quarter time, or full time). If you have a loan, you must also notify your lender of these changes.
- Understand the college's refund policy.
- Satisfactorily perform the work agreed upon in a Federal Work study job.
- Attend an entrance loan counseling session before receiving your first loan check.
- Attend an exit interview at the college if you have a Stafford or PLUS loan.
- Repay any student loans you have. When you sign a promissory note, you're agreeing to repay your loan.

DEBT MANAGEMENT

A student loan is a student debt and must be repaid. If a student leaves school or ceases to carry at least a half time academic load, the student must contact the lender or servicer immediately to set up a repayment schedule. There are no prepayment penalties under the Federal Stafford Student Loan Program.

Repayment of the loan may be deferred under certain circumstances as described in the promissory note and disclosure statement provided to the student by the lender. It is the student's responsibility to keep the school and lending institution informed as to changes in address and enrollment status.

You must repay this loan regardless of any future problems or complaints you may have about your school or your course of study.

There is no guarantee that you will secure employment in your chosen field following completion of training or withdrawal from the college, regardless of current "placement" rates. You must repay this loan after graduation or withdrawal, regardless of employment obstacles. However, you may be able to obtain an unemployment deferment or forbearance arrangement.

You must, without exception, report to your lender in writing should you:

- Fail to enroll in school for the period for which the loan was intended.
- Withdraw from school.
- Change your address or your parents' address.
- Change your name.
- Change your graduation date.
- You must use this loan for tuition and other reasonable and authorized educational expenses incurred to attend the school named for the period indicated on the application.

REPAYMENT EXAMPLES

The following examples are provided to illustrate repayment options and strategies.

Amount borrowed: \$1,000.00 at 6.8% interest.

Minimum monthly payment: is \$50.00

Term of repayment: 22 months

Amount borrowed: \$10,000.00 at 6.8% interest.

Lender requires: loans be paid in 5 years (60 months)

Monthly payment: \$200.05 OR

Lender allows: a 10-year (120-month) repayment schedule

Monthly repayment: \$121.33

Your repayment plan will be based on your choices and circumstances.

Remember that your lender or servicer may require a minimum monthly repayment.

DEFERMENTS

You may be eligible to defer payment on your loan(s). Contact your lender or servicer for details.

CONSOLIDATION

You may be eligible to consolidate your student loans to secure a single monthly repayment with one lender or servicer. Loans eligible for consolidation are listed below:

- Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL)
- Stafford Student Loan
- Perkins Loan
- Direct Loan

Contact your lender or servicer for more information.

LOAN SERVICERS

Many lenders do not service their own loans. Instead they contract with a student loan servicer to handle such functions as deferments and billing. Regardless of who holds your loan, it is your responsibility to maintain contact with the organization to establish a repayment schedule and provide notification of any status changes. If a servicer is employed to handle your loan, you will be notified in writing.

If you are unclear as to who currently holds your student loan, contact the original lender or the guarantor for this information.

OTHER NOTES OF IMPORTANCE

Lock-In Date

Your official registration status for financial aid purposes is locked in at the end of the 100% refund period. This typically falls about ten class days after your enrollment date during the fall and spring semesters. Contact the financial aid office if you want to know the lock-in date for a summer enrollment period.

Sophomore Status and Program Major

Once you have attempted 30 credit hours that would apply toward any program of study, you must declare a major to receive federal and state financial aid. This includes transfer courses that apply to the major you plan to pursue.

Status Changes

You are required to notify the financial aid office if you change your name, address or phone number. You must also contact us if considering a change in your class schedule.

Academic Problems

If you begin to experience academic problems, notify your advisor or counselor and a financial aid staff member immediately. The financial aid office has an appeal procedure for students with special circumstances.

Total Aid Package

All sources of financial assistance, whether listed on the Award Notification or not, are considered when determining the total amount of aid to which you are entitled. Total aid awarded cannot exceed the student's financial aid cost of attendance.

Professional Judgment

If you have financial challenges that you think the financial aid office should be aware of, please contact the financial aid director on the campus you plan to attend. Some circumstances that might affect your financial aid package or your ability to receive aid are:

1. Reduction in income from one year to the next.
2. Lengthy commute to campus or learning center site.
3. Financial hardships such as burdensome out-of-pocket medical expenses.
4. Problems meeting satisfactory academic progress.
5. Dependency status.

Buz E. Schultz Memorial Scholarship

One or two scholarships for up to \$500 each awarded to current high school seniors attending Grand Island Northwest, Broken Bow or Fullerton High School. Recipients may apply for renewal for their second year of study at CCC.

Coca-Cola All-State Community College Academic Team Scholarship

The Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation provides the Coca-Cola All-State Community College Academic Team program, providing up to \$450,000 in stipends. The top scoring student from each of the fifty states will be named a New Century Scholar and will receive a \$2,000 stipend. New Century Scholars will be presented at the AACC Convention. Fifty students will be named Gold Scholars, receiving \$1,500, fifty students will be named Silver Scholars, receiving \$1,250, and fifty students will be named Bronze Scholars, receiving \$1,000. A state may have multiple Gold, Silver, or Bronze Scholars. All scholars will also receive special medallions and will be listed in USA TODAY on Monday, April 19, 2010. Finally, an additional 150 national finalists will be selected from multiple states, each receiving a \$1,000 stipend. Applications are available from the CCC Campus President's office. Two students will be nominated from each campus.

Datatel Scholars Foundation Scholarship

Up to four scholarships for \$1,000 each awarded to current CCC students through four different Datatel programs: Datatel Scholars Foundation, Angelfire Scholarship, Returning Student Scholarship and the Nancy Goodhue-Lynch Scholarship. Center for Industry and Technology Scholarship

Up to ten scholarships for up to \$1,000 each awarded to current CCC students and/or current high school seniors. Applicants must be majoring in one of the following programs: Drafting Technology, Electrical Technology, Electronics Technology, Information Technology, Industrial Technology, Machine Tool Technology, Mechanics Technology or Welding Technology. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Chartwells Scholarship

Two scholarships for \$500 each awarded to current CCC students. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Claussen Charitable Trust Scholarship

One \$1,000 scholarship awarded to a current high school senior or current CCC student. Applicants must be majoring in a construction related program of study. Recipient must be enrolled at least half time.

Don Nelson Memorial Scholarship

One scholarship valued between \$200 and \$300 awarded to a current CCC students. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Dusty Dawn Klimek Memorial Scholarship

One scholarship of up to \$1,000 awarded to a current high school senior attending either Kearney Senior High or Grand Island Senior High. Applicants must be majoring in Nursing and demonstrate potential for this vocation. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Multiple scholarships of up to \$400 each awarded to current CCC students. Follett bookstore gift certificates in the amount of the award will be issued to recipients. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria.

One \$500 scholarship awarded to a current CCC student. Applicant must be a single parent who has successfully completed at least one semester at CCC majoring in Early Childhood Development, Elementary Education, or Pediatric Nursing. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Up to two \$250 scholarships awarded to current high school seniors attending either Grand Island Senior High, Grand Island Central Catholic or Grand Island Northwest High School. Recipients must be enrolled full time on any of the CCC campuses.

One \$1,000 scholarship awarded to a current high school senior or current CCC student. Academic Achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Two or three scholarships for up to \$600 each awarded to a current CCC student. Priority is given to current part-time Grand Island Campus employees. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Taylor Charitable Trust Scholarship

One \$1,000 scholarship or two \$500 scholarships awarded to current CCC students. Recipients must be Grand Island residents majoring in Nursing. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria.

Warren and Velda Wilson Campus Scholarship

One or two scholarships of up to \$1,000 each awarded to current high school seniors or current CCC students. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Bliss North Scholarship

Three to five \$1,000 scholarships awarded annually to students enrolling in any of the Allied Health Programs. This includes the following: Dental Hygiene, Dental Assisting, Health Information Management Services, Medical Assisting, and Medical Laboratory Technology. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Recipients must be enrolled at least half time.

Burke Estate Scholarship

Nebraska Public Power District Community College Scholarship

One or two scholarships valued between \$750 and \$1,000 each awarded to a current CCC student. Academic achievement and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria. Five \$1,000 scholarships awarded to current CCC students. Academic achievement, financial need and the overall quality of the application are the primary selection criteria.
